The Red Queen arrives at MONA

MONA's latest exhibition, The Red Queen, explores art and evolution. Which came first? The paintings or the feelings?

Launched during the Dark MoFo festival, *The Red Queen* looks at the idea that we have evolved into what we are because of art, not that that art has evolved because of us.

The name *The Red Queen* is from the *Through The Looking-Glass* Red Queen, running through a strange world, never making progress as she attempts to keep up with everything while wondering what the French for 'fiddle-de-dee'.

Elizabeth Pearce is a writer and researcher for MONA, and assisted with the background research for curators Nicole Durling and Olivier Verrene.

She says the *Red Queen* exhibition asks us to consider whether doing something without a seeming purpose is the product of us, or whether it actually contributes to changing us.

It's a question that will be taken up again in a following exhibition next year - considering the question of what is art, and how it is a factor in our evolution, rather than just the product of our evolution.

The exhibition in the Museum of Old and New Art is open to the public 18 June 2013 until April 2014.



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
